SkillsUSA to offer industry-driven knowledge and skill assessments

Leesburg, VA - SkillsUSA announces today that beginning this spring, they will offer industry-driven knowledge and skill assessments in technical areas that correspond to many career cluster areas. These Skill Connect Assessments are part of the SkillsUSA Work Force Ready System.

“We’re building our American work force by providing online technical assessments that may be used as a pre-test, end-of-program assessment, or as an entry portal to existing credentialing organizations, such as AWS (American Welding Society) or NCCER (National Center for Construction Education and Research),” says SkillsUSA Executive Director Tim Lawrence. “Skill Connect Assessments help students show they’ve got what it takes to begin rewarding careers while helping instructors prove the benefits of career and technical education programs. Additionally, local employers can have more confidence in understanding the competency of a skilled work force.”

This spring, eight of the 46 technical assessments will be available online with simulations and features that deliver a reliable assessment for CTE students. As more assessments are developed, they will be housed in an online system that provides technical assistance, student progress tracking and the opportunity for instructor feedback on the assessments.

“We built our assessments with guidance from independent research conducted in the spring of this year with CTE directors, state administrators and CTE instructors nationwide,” Lawrence said. “Educators gave us the big picture of CTE assessments, and we’re working to address the needs they identified. For example, instructors should find that Skill Connect Assessments help them meet Perkins IV requirements for student achievement.”
